Background

The Rural Innovation Support Service (RISS) is a Scottish Government funded project to encourage a "bottom-up" approach to rural innovation and provide support to farmers, crofters or foresters who require expertise and assistance to help them adopt innovative ideas or practices.

SRUC are project partners in the delivery of RISS and our role is to provide a facilitator and the "brokerage service" linking farmers with researchers,





commercial companies and the best expertise available to take your innovative or business idea

off the ground. Innovative ideas can vary from developing and implementing a new technology to establishing a new quality standard.

Opportunities for Farmers

We will form a working group around you and your farm, bringing in members from any useful sector depending on what kind of knowledge or experience you need, be it from the tech, supply chain, business or research sectors. As well as brokering a group and identifying the correct expertise, SRUC can also

Complete survey work and carry out small feasibility, field labs or demonstration projects

Identify suitable funding to help support the project

Identify technologies and areas of best practice from out with Scotland which can be duplicated

How does RISS work?

Step 1: You become part of a group

You tell us briefly about your idea: get in touch

We link you up with the right facilitator and you talk it over in more detail

☐ The facilitator applies for group approval

with them

Step 2: You work as a group

☐ The facilitator enables a period of group working: defining, developing and testing ideas and solutions. The way the group works and the time it will takes

☐ They bring in the other group members you will need (from any sector)

depends on what you are trying to do

☐ The group produces a project plan, with next steps in mind

Step 3: You have everything you need to get going

☐ You have a final project plan that can be used to access funding if necessary, or just to get started

The local SCOCAN (organic oilseed rape project) started off as a RISS project so the opportunity is there and worth considering. The current RISS round of applications is nearly closed. More information can be found at

Rural Leadership

The Scottish Enterprise Rural Leadership Programme, is open for applications. It will be no surprise to you that the format of delivery will be different this year. Covid has impacted on many things and SERLP is no exception. This year it will be delivered as a virtual programme that retains the core elements of previous delivery. It is specifically designed to develop leadership skills to help business people work through this period of change and take advantage of the opportunities that will no doubt emerge. The programme will be of particular benefit to those people who find themselves and their business at a crossroads.

We are looking for 30 applicants from the Scottish Enterprise area and 10 applicants from the HIE area for a 6-month delivery of short online workshops and webinars of mostly 2 hours duration. The programme will run from late October 2020 to early March 2021. This will involve roughly 40 hours of virtual sessions and approximately 20 hours of own time working to be delivered through four regional groups with 10 people in each.

We are seeking business leaders or key employees who have ambitions for the future of their business and recognise the need to change their business model, learn new skills, embrace digital technologies and respond to their customers' needs. We always attract busy people and we expect this year's virtual programme will be more accessible timewise and logistically. We have put in a lot of work, redesigning the programme ensuring that the delivery meets with participants' needs.
